

ABSTRACT

“ THE GREAT CITY DEBATE AND ISTANBUL ”

This talk has two themes: first, how we have tended to think in the past about great cities and how and why we are tending to nuance these views over time; and second, to note and explain how three efforts to cope with physical development in Istanbul in the course of this century have affected - or might yet affect - our image of Istanbul's architectural heritage. The three effort discussed are the shift of the capital to Ankara, the Eastern Marmara development strategy in the 1960's, and the Gestalt change in attitudes to gecekondu development. And the main thesis is that some of the ideas that are changing our perceptions about great cities may perhaps deepen and extend our perceptions about architectural heritage.

Lloyd Rodwin, currently Ford International Professor Emeritus & Senior Lecturer, School of Architecture & Planning, at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (M.I.T.) was the co - founder of the Joint Center of Urban Studies of M.I.T. and Harvard University (1959) and Head of Faculty Policy Committee of the Joint Center (1959 - 1969); also Director of the Special Program for Urban & Regional Studies of Developing Countries (SPURS); and former President of the Regional Science Association.
